A faster response: Gresham's new rescue unit in action

"Whatever the day demands."

- Quote inside Rescue 72

n a Wednesday morning, an alarm sounds at the fire station. Quickly, Lt. Lloyd Nickson and Firefighter/Paramedic Chris Hatch are on the road in Gresham Fire's new Rescue 72.

They're responding to a choking call. Inside the home, they find a man who has managed to dislodge most of the food but still feels chest pressure.

"We're reading the room the whole time," Lt. Nickson says. "Because on every call, your safety is my responsibility today."

They check the man's vitals and notice swelling in his legs. He confirms he has congestive heart failure. The responders calmly explain he needs to go to the hospital, and he agrees.

With Rescue 72, "We can answer more medical calls, faster," Lt. Nickson says. "And the rescue is quicker because it's a smaller rig."

The vehicle returns to the station, ready for the next call.



Gresham's second fire rescue unit - its first new 911 vehicle in over 30 years - responds to emergencies faster and more efficiently than a full fire engine.

A step forward for Gresham Fire

Thanks to the Fire and Police Levy, Gresham Fire will fully staff Rescue 72 with a dedicated 24-hour team starting in July.

The levy also allows for the promotion of experienced firefighters to officer roles - critical because a rescue unit must have an officer onboard to respond to fires.

"It's a step in the right direction," says Lt. Nickson. "It increases staffing, gets more people on the fire scene, and reduces our reliance on Portland."

Gresham is turning this investment into real progress - building safer neighborhoods, improving emergency response, and strengthening our community.

Staying safe in extreme heat

ast summer was the hottest on record in North America, leading to more urgent care visits for heat-related illness and injury.

The City is developing a Heat Strategy Plan to better prepare the community for extreme heat events.

"Community health is a key focus in Gresham's Climate Action Plan," said Denise Lopez, Climate Action Analyst. "We're working with local partners to improve livability and safety in vulnerable neighborhoods."

Tips for staying safe and healthy

- Drink plenty of fluids.
- Take cool showers or baths.
- Wear lightweight, loose-fitting clothes.
- Avoid using your stove or oven.

Take care of others

· Check on vulnerable neighbors, especially those living alone; twice a day is best.

• Watch for heat-related symptoms in seniors, young children and those with health conditions.

- · If outside, ensure pets have shade and

unlimited water.

Gresham stands together to stop violence

A focused effort is underway in Gresham to get guns off the streets and connect youth at risk with the support they need to build stronger, brighter futures.

Recently, Gresham became the smallest city in the nation to adopt Ceasefire, a national gun violence prevention program. It brings together City leaders, law enforcement, health services, and community groups to address Gresham's needs.

"By working together, we can break cycles of violence and create a safer,

more thriving Gresham for everyone," said Gresham Police Chief Travis Gullberg.

Trust, time and transformation

Because Ceasefire is communitybased, partners understand the root causes of youth violence.

"The support they need first is love, but they don't spell it love they spell it T-I-M-E," said Michael Fesser, Executive Director of Going Home II.

"They relate to people with trusted, lived experiences. We show them through our changed lives that they can change theirs."

Turning incidents into intervention

Ceasefire tracks every shooting in Gresham.

Derik Minard named Gresham Fire Chief

The City welcomes Chief Derik Minard to the Gresham Fire Department. Minard joined Gresham Fire in January as interim Fire Chief and was sworn in April 1.

With decades of experience and a strong commitment to public safety, he emerged as the top candidate in Gresham's national search following the retirement of Chief Scott Lewis.

"The success of this department is measured by the morale, growth, and well-being of our firefighters and emergency responders," Chief Minard said. "When people ask, my answer is simple – it's about the people." Minard brings 34 years of fire service experience, having served as Fire Chief in Westminster, Colorado, and Savannah, Georgia. He has held every rank in the fire service.

He holds a master's degree in leadership, a bachelor's in public safety administration, and is a certified Executive Fire Officer through the National Fire Academy.

"His vision and experience make him the right person to guide the department forward, and we are fortunate to have him," said City Manager Eric Schmidt.

Gresham is a City that cares, Minard says. "That really speaks to me."

Ceasefire success: A story of intervention

Recently, four teens in a stolen car, one armed, were looking for trouble in Gresham. At an apartment complex, they confronted another group of teens. Tensions rose, a shot was fired, and the 15-year-old driver was hit in the leg.

Instead of spiraling into more violence, Ceasefire stepped in.

The result? Seven of the eight teens accepted help — services, support, and even relocation for one who wasn't safe.

"We've prevented retaliation, supported seven families, and got five guns off the street," said Sgt. Matt Fagan.

A moment of danger became a turning point, thanks to quick action and community care.



Key points we've heard from the community

• Keep parks, trails, and natural areas fire resilient, safe and well-maintained.

• Improve existing parks so they're easier to use and access.

• Build new parks in neighborhoods that don't have them yet.

• Work with local groups to bring more programs and activities.

• Identify long-term funding to support parks and recreation.

The updated Parks, Recreation, Trails and Natural Areas Master Plan will go to City Council for adoption later this year.

A 'Pleasant' ending

A fter two years of work, updates to the Pleasant Valley Plan are officially adopted! Both the Planning Commission and City Council approved the changes, which took effect on April 17.

Pleasant Valley was first planned as a 1,532-acre "complete community" with a mix of land uses, transportation options and natural spaces. Since parts of that vision are still undeveloped more than 20 years later, this update will help the City better support those goals.

Community input was key in shaping the updated plan. Highlights include:

Better transportation: The plan focuses on improving roads and connections to meet residents' needs.

More housing options: New standards encourage a mix of housing types and designs in neighborhoods.

• **Open space:** Larger subdivisions must include green space, giving residents access to nature as the area grows.

▶ Walkable places: The Plan supports building commercial areas near housing so people can walk or bike to shops and services.

Oregon recycling gets major update

For the first time, businesses that make packaging and paper products will help fund recycling. Their contributions will improve local facilities and expand recycling services across the state.

These changes are part of Oregon's Plastic Pollution and Recycling Modernization Act, a new law aimed at making recycling more efficient, environmentally responsible and consistent in every community.

Many upgrades will happen behind the scenes first, such as improved equipment and better material tracking, so visible changes may take a few years. But the result will be a stronger, more effective system that's easier to use, better for the environment, and fairer for workers and communities.

The law also strengthens existing rules to ensure recyclables are turned into new products. Facilities must track materials, follow health and safety standards and pay fair wages. These improvements mean Oregonians can recycle with greater confidence.

For now, what goes in your bin remains mostly the same. It may take a few years before new items are added as upgrades roll out and services grow.

Recycling right keeps the system working. When we all do our part, it saves energy and water, prevents pollution and boosts our local economy.

Groundwater system expansion: Projects well underway

Coming in 2026, the new system will deliver high-quality, affordable water to customers of Gresham and Rockwood

Our expanded groundwater system, made up of nine interconnected projects, is well underway — ahead of schedule and within budget!

Partnering with the Rockwood Water People's Utility District gives us a rare chance to build and operate our own exceptional groundwater system. It also helps us keep water rates stable and provide reliable service for years to come.

> **Groundwater Fact:** Did you know Gresham and Rockwood already drink groundwater? During peak summer demand, about 15-30 percent is blended with Portland water.

Building for the future

Cascade groundwater comes from the deep, naturally protected Sand and Gravel Aquifer and is already used for drinking water by many nearby communities.

When finished, the system will produce 25 million gallons of clean, refreshing water every day.

The expanded system includes groundwater wells, water treatment facilities and storage tanks, along with miles of earthquake-safe pipeline to connect the system.

The system is being built to ensure the water tastes great and meets or exceeds state and federal drinking water quality standards.

The City continues to reliably provide excellent quality water that meets or exceeds all state and federal safe drinking water requirements. In 2024, the City tested its
